This report highlights the Committee of the Whole’s considerable accomplishments during the two-year period marking the 22nd Council Period of the Council of the District of Columbia. The report that follows includes a summary of activities, a survey of the many legislative and oversight achievements during the period, and a review of the Committee’s budget recommendations for fiscal years 2018 and 2019. Appendices provide a listing of the measures marked up by the Committee during Council Period 22, a chronology of the Committee’s public hearings and roundtables, and the minutes of Committee meetings.

I. JURISDICTION¹

During Council Period 22, the Committee of the Whole (“Committee”) was responsible for matters concerning annual budget, and amendments, additions, or supplements to the budget; coordinating the Council’s relationships with the Congress and the Federal executive branch; monitoring the progress of Council legislation through Congress; monitoring the status of original legislative proposals in Congress that may affect the District, the Council, or its legislation; amendments to the District Charter; Council appointments to Boards and Commissions; public-space naming; street and alley acquisition and closing; reapportionment and realignment of the political subdivisions of the District; Council administration and personnel; the scheduling of all matters for consideration by the Council in the legislative meeting; legislative matters related to the District as a political entity, including voting rights and

statehood; grants management; government procurement; coordinating the Council's relationships with appropriate regional, state, and national associations and organizations; the Council's relationship with regional authorities and other regional bodies and organizations not specifically assigned to other committees; truancy (jointly with the Committee on Education); District employees' retirement; the development of the Comprehensive Plan and other matters pertaining to land use; matters related to statehood and self-determination for the District; revision and codification of Title 49 of the D.C. Official Code; public-education matters exclusively concerning the University of the District of Columbia or the Community College of the District of Columbia; international business and affairs; consumer and regulatory affairs; and other matters assigned to it by these Rules or by the Chairman.

In addition, the Committee is greatly assisted by the work of central office staff designated to assist the Committee of the Whole including Dan Golden, Assistant General Counsel, Office of the General Counsel, and Anne Phelps, Budget Counsel, Office of the Budget Director. The entire staff of the Office of the Secretary assists the Committee with coordinating agendas and staffing hearings, roundtables, and meetings. Formulation of the Committee of the Whole's Council-wide budget recommendations to the full Council would not be possible without the work of the entire Budget Office staff.

III. SUBCOMMITTEES

The Committee of the Whole did not create subcommittees during Council Period 22.

IV. SUMMARY OF COMMITTEE ACTIVITIES

During Council Period 22 there were 153 bills and 82 proposed resolutions referred to the Committee of the Whole. 72 bills and 60 resolutions were marked up. Two resolutions were deemed approved. Three bills and seven resolutions were withdrawn before Committee action.

The Committee held 55 hearings (plus one reconvened hearing), 27 roundtables (plus one reconvened roundtable), four joint hearings, three joint roundtables (plus one reconvened roundtable), eight performance oversight hearings, two budget briefings, and eight budget oversight hearings.

The Committee conducted 17 regular meetings and 21 additional meetings to consider legislation and reports in the Committee and process reports from other committees.

A complete list of the Committee's bills, resolutions, reports, hearings, roundtables, and meetings is detailed below.

V. SUMMARY OF COMMITTEE OVERSIGHT ACTIVITIES

The Committee laid out a number of overarching goals for Council Period 22. These goals were supported in large part by conducting public, transparent hearings and roundtables where the Committee could hear testimony on issues of interest to the Committee and press agency heads for more accountability. Those goals are listed below, with a brief description of activities the Committee took in furtherance of those goals.

- ***Encourage Growth of the University of the District of Columbia:*** Support the University of the District of Columbia's efforts to secure re-accreditation and grow enrollment at both the flagship and the community college.

Over the past two years, the University of the District of Columbia (UDC) has continued to improve. Through the performance and budget process, the Committee has urged UDC to raise enrollment at both its flagship and community college, develop strategies to increase private fundraising for both operational and capital project funds, improve its facilities and technology infrastructure, and increase its graduation and completion rates. In an effort to aid the University in these areas, the Committee continued a fundraising match – for every two dollars UDC raised, the District would provide it with one dollar – and increased its capital budget so that the University can improve its facilities and undertake technology updates more quickly.

In order for such improvements to continue, UDC, which is an independent, public university, needs to have a strong Board of Trustees (Board) who have the requisite knowledge and expertise necessary to make UDC a competitive, world-class institution of higher education. The Board is comprised of 15 members – 11 of whom are nominated by the Mayor and confirmed by the Council. During Council Period 22, six of the Board members' terms ended. The Committee strongly advocated for a diverse set of trustees to ensure that individuals with a background in higher education or fundraising, as well as those with knowledge on the operations of both four-year and community colleges, were all represented on the Board. As such, the Committee ensured through its confirmation hearing process that the six nominees, four of whom were reappointments and two of whom were new appointments, were well-suited to remain, or become, Board members.

- ***Improve Services at the Department of Consumer and Regulatory Affairs:*** Focus efforts on efficient operations and quality service delivery by the Department of Consumer and Regulatory Affairs.

In addition to two agency performance oversight and two budget oversight hearings concerning the Department of Consumer and Regulatory Affairs, the Committee conducted a series of six oversight hearings on various aspects of the Department throughout the course of the Council Period. During a hearing at the beginning of the Council Period asking the public what the Committee should focus on, over 20 individuals provided testimony. That resulted in hearings on Inspections and Enforcement of Tenant Housing, Permitting Services and Illegal Construction, Management of the Vacant and Blighted Property Program, and a case study on Housing Code Enforcement.

The Committee also found that the problems that plague DCRA are only a small fraction of what DCRA's mission is. They are also responsible for issues from professional licensing, to standards for weights and measures, to food truck regulation. It became clear to the Committee that the current mission of DCRA is too broad to manage the agency effectively. Thus, Chairman Mendelson introduced legislation, Bill 22-669, the "Department of Buildings Establishment Act of 2018" which would take some of the most troubling parts of DCRA dealing with building safety and regulation and put them in a new agency that can focus on that important mission. The Committee held a hearing on that proposal on April 19, 2018 and included dollars in the Fiscal Year 2019 budget to further look at how the proposal could move forward.

- ***Improve Effective Government Procurement:*** Focus on continued improvement of agency contracting and procurement with consolidated procurement operations and training and certification of the District's procurement workforce.

Procurement, at least under the auspices of the Office of Contracting and Procurement, continues to improve in the District after a number of years of rigorous oversight by the Committee of the Whole. That agency has doubled in size and completely restructured into a stronger organization that with a focus on customer service for its customer agencies. There is still much to be done in this area, including finding opportunities to further consolidate procurement functions. To further this goal, the Committee held a hearing on March 15, 2017 on Bill 22-46, the "Department of General Services Procurement Authority Amendment Act of 2018" that would transfer DGS's procurement functions into the Office of Contracting and Procurement.

- ***Support Fair and Reasonable Land Use Policies:*** Oversight of land use policies in the District including issuance of special exceptions and variances from zoning regulations, adherence to the regulations by the zoning administrator, and implementation of a revised Comprehensive Land Use Plan for the District of Columbia.

The Committee believes that fair and reasonable land use policies can contribute to solutions for a number of the issues facing the District. It is essential that the District maintain its rich historic and cultural resources while looking at new policies to encourage inclusive development and affordable housing for District residents. An important part of this is the myriad boards and commissions that are charged with carrying out the District's land use policies, including the Zoning Commission, Board of Zoning Adjustment, and the Historic Preservation Review Board. The Committee held hearings on a dozen nominations to those boards and commissions ensuring that the boards could continue their work without delay. The Committee has been forceful in ensuring that members of those boards understand the commitment needed, and the important issues decided by the boards.

In addition, the Committee held a hearing on the Mayor's proposed amendments to the Framework Element of the Comprehensive Plan. Over 100 witnesses testified to the strengths and weaknesses of the proposal, and the Committee continues to work through additional

improvements to the Mayor’s proposal. The Committee expects continued focus on the Comprehensive Plan in Council Period 23.

- ***Sustain Truancy Reforms***: Identify and promote implementation of truancy reform initiatives as a means to divert at-risk students from the school-to-prison pipeline, with an emphasis on data collection to measure results, and strategies to improve attendance.

The Committee held four hearings, which focused on the various laws, regulations, and initiatives undertaken to reduce truancy and chronic absenteeism. Additionally, the Committee is a member of the Every Day Counts! Taskforce and regularly attends Taskforce meetings, which bring together representatives from the legislature and several Executive branch agencies in an effort to address school absenteeism. Through the oversight hearings and Taskforce meetings, the Committee engaged in strong oversight and pressed the District’s education-related agencies, Child and Family Services Agency, Court Social Services, and the District’s Office of the Attorney General to identify methods and services that will aid students and their families and address the reasons for why students are missing school. While not every student who is truant enters the criminal justice system, many youth who are involved in the juvenile justice system were truant. Thus, the Committee views truancy as an early warning signal that there may be dysfunction in a child’s home or at school that needs to be addressed. Much work still needs to be done in this area, and the Committee intends to continue to hold, at least quarterly, performance oversight hearings on this issue.

VI. SUMMARY OF SIGNIFICANT COMMITTEE LEGISLATION

All legislation has some significance, or else the Committee would not be legislating in the area. However, certain legislation is especially significant given its impact on the residents of the District or its contribution to more efficient, effective, or fairer government. Below is a list of the Committee’s most significant legislative accomplishments.

- **Bill 22-92**, “Short-Term Rental Regulation Act of 2018”

This legislation created a much-needed regulatory structure for the emerging home-sharing economy. Until this legislation was passed, there was little regulation of short-term rental housing in the District – in fact during the Committee’s deliberation on the bill, it was determined that many of the short-term rentals that have been in operation in residential areas of the District were disallowed under the District of Columbia’s Zoning Regulations. The new legislation provides for a regulatory framework to ensure basic health and safety for short-term rentals in the District, and policy initiatives aimed at preserving housing stock in the District for long term rentals for District residents.

- **Bill 22-395**, “Accessible and Transparent Procurement Amendment Act of 2018”

Procurement of goods and services in the District accounts for a massive amount of the annual District budget to support essential District functions. Moreover, District government procurement is a powerful tool to direct District taxpayer dollars back into District businesses.

The most significant business development program in this regard is the Certified Business Enterprise program which directs many of the dollars spent by the District in to small or locally owned businesses. Transparency in the District's procurement spending is important to ensure that the dollars are being spent wisely, and that District businesses are benefiting. This legislation requires increased transparency in contracting including payment information to contractors, a more robust procurement website, and a one-stop-shop webpage where prospective offerors can go to find business opportunities in District contracting.

- **Bill 22-539**, "Boris Nemtsov Plaza Designation Act of 2017"

Many street and alley name designations are significant in that they honor individuals or ideas important to neighborhoods in the District. However, this legislation carried particular significance not just locally, but nationally and internationally. Boris Nemtsov was a physicist, a statesman, and a prominent leader in the effort to realize democratic, anti-corruption principles in the Russian government. On February 27, 2015, days after leading a protest against Russia's war with the Ukraine, Mr. Nemtsov was assassinated in Moscow, two-hundred yards from the Kremlin wall. In 2017, legislation was introduced in Congress to designate the block in front of the Russian Embassy as "Boris Nemtsov Plaza." As a result of collaboration with Delegate Eleanor Holmes Norton (D-DC) and Senators Rubio and Chris Coons (D-DE), it was found that it was more appropriate to defer the designation to local legislation, as Wisconsin Avenue, N.W. is a District-owned street. As a result, the Committee passed this legislation and coordinated an unveiling event for the new signage in front of the Russian Embassy, creating a memorial in Mr. Nemtsov's honor that cannot be dismantled. Further, the designation serves as an opportunity for the Council, the representative body of our nation's dynamic and inclusive capitol city, to reaffirm support for democracy and to send a message of solidarity to those fighting for democracy around the world.

- **Bill 22-913**, "Tipped Wage Workers Fairness Amendment Act of 2018"

Over the past several years, the District has enacted several labor-friendly laws, including drastic increases in the minimum wage. All individuals employed in the District are entitled to the minimum wage. Generally, individuals who receive gratuities, also known as tipped workers, earn equal to or above the hourly minimum wage through tips they receive combined with the "tipped minimum wage," which they are entitled to regardless of how much they earn per hour in tips. Thus, every individual employed in the District, regardless of whether an individual is a tipped worker, is entitled to at least \$13.25 per hour, and by July 1, 2020, will be earning at least \$15.00 per hour. However, on June 19, 2018, a ballot initiative – Initiative 77 – was approved during a primary election. That initiative sought to phase out the tipped minimum wage in favor of a universal minimum wage. This proved controversial in the tipped worker community. Proponents of Initiative 77 argued that elimination of the tip credit argued a single minimum wage would address issues of wage theft and sexual harassment in the workplace. The Committee of the Whole held a hearing where the overwhelming sentiment of those District tipped wage workers was to keep the status quo, worried that if enacted, elimination of the tip credit could lead to lower revenues for businesses and notably lower tips which they depend on.

In response, the Committee crafted new legislation that repealed the initiative – preserving the status quo for the tip credit. The legislation also included a number of changes to the law aimed at addressing wage theft and requiring additional training to address workplace sexual harassment in the industry. While some argued that overturning an initiative is anti-democratic, the Committee viewed Initiative 77 as any other piece of legislation passed in the District. Ultimately the Committee’s action led to continuation of the status quo for tipped employees, but also providing for important new workplace protections.

VII. SUMMARY OF BUDGET RECOMMENDATIONS

- Decrease of 1.0 FTEs in local funds to Program 2000, Activity 2010 (OANC Staff).
- Decrease of \$7,600.00 in local funds to CSG-41, Program 2000, Activity 2010 (OANC NPS).
- Increase of \$18,000.00 in local funds to CSG-70, Program 2000, Activity 2010 (Website and Software).
- Increase of \$74,175.00 in local funds to CSG-70, Program 2000, Activity 2010 (Network Upgrades).

Policy Recommendations:

- The Committee recommends that the Auditor and the Council work with the Executive to identify space in the building for the Auditor and a new tenant for the 717 14th Street NW space.

Office of Contracting and Procurement

Operating Budget Recommendation:

- Decrease of 25,000,000.00 in intra-District funds to Program 1000, Activity 1020, CSG-40 (Other Services and Charges).
- Increase of \$95,791.00 local funds to Program 8000, Activity 8030, CSG-11 (Regular Pay).
- Increase of \$19,925.00 in local funds to Program 8000, Activity 8030, CSG-14 (Fringe).

Capital Budget Recommendation:

- Recommend adoption of the fiscal year 2018 capital budget as proposed by the Mayor.

Policy Recommendations:

- The Committee recommends that OCP continue to aggressively fill vacant positions and employ strategies to reduce turnover.
- The Committee recommends that OCP broaden the Procurement Training Institute and the certification program to other agencies covered by the PPRA, especially the Department of General Services.

- The Committee recommends that OCP monitor closely its surplus property sales targets to ensure that funding is available to cover the costs of the surplus property division.

Metropolitan Washington Council of Governments

Operating Budget Recommendation:

- Recommend adoption of the fiscal year 2018 budget as proposed by the Mayor.

Policy Recommendations:

- The Committee recommends that MWCOG should continue to implement programs and policies to increase regional cooperation and foster regionalism, especially leading the charge with the formation of the Metro Safety Commission.

Statehood Initiatives

Operating Budget Recommendation:

- Recommend adoption of the fiscal year 2018 budget as proposed by the Mayor.

Policy Recommendations:

- The Committee recommends that the Commission convene to adopt a fiscal year 2017 budget and a fiscal year 2018 budget based on the budget approved by the Council.
- The Committee recommends that the Commission adopt a proposed budget for fiscal year 2019 to be submitted to the Mayor before the Mayor's budget submission.
- The Committee recommends that the Commission develop a comprehensive, multi-year strategy to achieve statehood and develop future budget requests to support the plan.

Office of Budget and Planning

Operating Budget Recommendation:

- Recommend adoption of the fiscal year 2018 budget as proposed by the Mayor.

Policy Recommendations:

- Recommend that OBP maximize the capital resources available to make necessary improvements to its IT systems to prevent system degradation and obsolescence.

Office of Planning

Operating Budget Recommendation:

- Increase of \$79,275.00 in local funds to CSG 11, Program 2000, Activity 2020 (HPO Staff salary).
- Increase of \$16,965.00 in local funds to CSG 14, Program 2000, Activity 2020 (HPO Staff Fringe).
- Increase of 1.0 FTE in Activity 2020, Local Funds (Create new HPO Inspector).
- Increase of \$200,000.00 in local funds to CSG 50, Program 7000, Activity 7010 for a competitive grant to improve federally-owned parkland in the District (one time).

Policy Recommendations:

- The Committee recommends that OP work with DCRA to streamline 311 calls pertaining to illegal historic preservation construction for quicker response times.
- The Committee recommends that OP continue to engage with the community and stakeholders across the District throughout the Comprehensive Plan Amendment Cycle.

Office of Zoning

Operating Budget Recommendation:

- Recommend adoption of the fiscal year 2018 budget as proposed by the Mayor.

Policy Recommendations:

- The Committee recommends that OZ ensure that BZA members are rigorously trained in the legal standards for variances and special exceptions, including training days devoted exclusively to that topic.
- The Committee recommends that the OZ fully utilize its dedicated OAG staff attorney assigned specifically to the Zoning Commission to ensure its increasing caseload demands are properly met.
- The Committee recommends that the Mayor and Council approve a BZA nominee to fill the current vacancy who can meet the required time commitment and adhere strictly to the zoning code.

Department of Consumer and Regulatory Affairs

Operating Budget Recommendation:
