**SUBJECT:** Report on Bill 23-22, the “Adelaide Alley Designation Act of 2019”

The Committee of the Whole, to which Bill 23-22, the “Adelaide Alley Designation Act of 2019” was referred, reports favorably thereon with technical amendments, and recommends approval by the Council.

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**I. BACKGROUND AND NEED**

On January 7, 2019 Bill 23-22, the “Adelaide Alley Designation Act of 2019” was introduced by Councilmember Allen to officially designate the east-west portion of the alley system in Square 1090, which is bounded by 16<sup>th</sup> Street S.E., D Street, S.E., 17<sup>th</sup> Street, S.E., and E Street, S.E., in Ward 6, as Adelaide Alley. An official naming typically involves the designation of postal addresses and enables the placement of the primary entrance to residences or offices on the alley.

***Official Naming***

Andrew and Hannah Linn are the owners of Lot 60 within Square 1090. Lot 60 is currently landlocked by the interior alley system in the square. The Linns are seeking to obtain building permits to build a by-right home on the lot. The lot is zoned as Residential Flat (RF-1), the purpose of which is to provide for small lots within which no more than two dwelling units are permitted in areas predominantly developed with attached row houses.<sup>1</sup>

The purpose of the proposed alley designation is so that the Linns can obtain a building permit to construct the home.<sup>2</sup> Currently, the Department of Consumer and Regulatory Affairs will not issue a building permit to construct a residence without an address, and an address cannot be designated on an unnamed alley (although the regulation specifically relates to the assignment of street numbers and not building permits).<sup>3</sup>

Adelaide Johnson was a noted human rights advocate and sculptor. She is probably best known for her monument to the women's suffrage movement in the United States Capitol. The Portrait Monument to Lucretia Mott, Elizabeth Cady Stanton, and Susan B. Anthony was commissioned by the National Woman's Party and was accepted by Congress. The monument combines a copy of three individual busts carved by Johnson and displayed at the World's Columbian Exposition in 1893. Adelaide Johnson died in 1955. Her career spanned the construction of the original homes on Square 1090, which is also a block from Congressional Cemetery where Johnson was buried.

### ***Legal Background***

The Street and Alley Closing and Acquisition Procedures Act of 1982, effective March 10, 1983 (D.C. Law 4-201; D.C. Official Code § 9-204.01 *et seq.*) ("Act") establishes procedures for closing streets and alleys, opening new streets and alleys, naming public spaces, and other procedures related to streets and alleys. Specifically, the Act authorizes the Council to symbolically or officially designate or change the name of any public space in the District of Columbia, including streets and alleys.<sup>4</sup> In October 2016, the Act was amended to create a clear distinction between official and symbolic street and alley namings and to establish distinct processes and requirements for each type of naming.<sup>5</sup>

An "official name" refers to the legal designation of an alley or a street for mailing address and other purposes,<sup>6</sup> whereas a symbolic name for a street or alley shall be in addition to and subordinate to any name that is an official name.<sup>7</sup> An alley may only be designated with an official name when the alley provides the only access or the primary access to a residential or commercial property.<sup>8</sup> Further, an official name of an alley shall contain the suffix "Alley" or "Court."<sup>9</sup> A symbolic name of a street or alley shall contain only the suffix "Way" or "Plaza."<sup>10</sup>

"Adelaide Alley" will be an official alley designation. Furthermore, the public alley system in Square 1090 provides the only access to Lot 60.

The Act also establishes notice requirements for official designations. First, at least 15 days, but no more than 60 days prior to the scheduled public hearing, the initiator of the proposed designation shall: 1) give written notice of the date, time, and location of the hearing to each owner of property and household occupying property that abuts the alley or street, or portion thereof, proposed to be designated with an official name; and 2) post signs that indicate the date, time, and location of the Council hearing at each intersection with any other alley or street of the portion of the alley or street proposed to be designated.<sup>11</sup> The initiator shall certify to the Council that the notice required has been given.<sup>12</sup> Second, at least 30 days prior to the scheduled public hearing, the initiator shall submit a copy of the proposed legislation for review and comment to each Advisory Neighborhood Commission (“ANC”) in which the portion of the alley or street to be designated is located.<sup>13</sup> Third, at least five days prior to the hearing, the initiator shall submit to Council letters or a petition in support of the proposal that have been signed by a majority of the owners of property and households occupying property that abuts the portion of the alley or street proposed to be designated with an official name.<sup>14</sup>

Lastly, prior to consideration of a designation by the Council, the Mayor shall provide to the Council a surveyor’s plat of the alley or street and adjacent properties.<sup>15</sup> The District Department of Transportation (“DDOT”) provided the Council with a surveyor’s plat of Square 1090 at the November 14, 2018 hearing on Bill 22-880. The plat was subsequently updated to reflect the intention that the east-west portion of the alley system be officially designated, a copy of which is attached to this report.

Regarding Bill 23-880, the notice requirements with regard to posting signs and providing a petition before the hearing were not met by the initiator. However, the Committee recommends moving forward with the naming, notwithstanding the specific notice requirements in the law. The 2016 amendments to the naming process set a high bar for official names, in part because of “the name of the street being officially connected to the residents through every day usage – i.e., mailing address and everything else that comes with the name of one’s street.”<sup>16</sup> In this case the only address that will be on Adelaide Alley will be that of the initiator. The initiator also provided a petition on January 6, 2019 signed by 20 abutting households expressing support for the naming. There are three single-family homes abutting the portion of the alley to be named, in addition to a condominium building with 31 units. The petition is attached.

At its regularly scheduled and noticed meeting on March 13, 2018, ANC 6B voted unanimously to support the naming. In a letter to Councilmember Allen dated March 15, 2018, ANC 6B commented that it supports introduction of emergency legislation to name the interior alley as Adelaide Alley, which is the subject of Bill 23-22.

After the official street or alley designation legislation becomes law and all conditions required by the Council and the Act have been satisfied, DDOT will install signage indicating the official name

of the alley or street, or portion thereof and remove signs, if any, with a previous name.<sup>17</sup> “At least one sign bearing the previous name of the alley or street, or portion thereof, shall be transferred to the Archives of the District of Columbia.”<sup>18</sup> The Mayor shall update relevant records of the District of Columbia to reflect the official name of an alley or street, or portion thereof, including: Fire and Emergency Medical Service records, Homeland Security and Emergency Management records, District of Columbia maps, and any other record that the District of Columbia uses for way-finding or address purposes.<sup>19</sup> The Mayor shall also notify the United States Postal Service, other relevant government agencies as determined by the Mayor, and relevant private sector entities.<sup>20</sup> Additionally, the Surveyor of the District of Columbia shall record a copy of the legislation and the Surveyor’s plat in the Office of the Surveyor.<sup>21</sup>

Officially designating the alley in Square 1090 as “Adelaide Alley” will facilitate the assignment of addresses to the unnamed alley and honor the Adelaide Johnson’s contribution to women’s rights. For these reasons, the Committee of the Whole recommends the approval of Bill 23-22, the “Adelaide Alley Designation Act of 2019.”

## II. LEGISLATIVE CHRONOLOGY

### III. POSITION OF THE EXECUTIVE

Dena Iverson, Chief of External Affairs, Office of the Director, District Department of Transportation, testified on behalf of the Executive that it had “no objection” to the alley naming of Bill 23-22. Her testimony is summarized below.

### IV. COMMENTS OF ADVISORY NEIGHBORHOOD COMMISSIONS

By letter dated March 15, 2018, ANC 6B, in which the proposed official designation is located, communicated that the ANC on March 13, 2018 had voted 5-0-0, in support of renaming the alley in Square 1090 as “Adelaide Alley.”

### V. SUMMARY OF TESTIMONY

The Committee of the Whole held a public hearing on several bills, including Bill 22-880, on Wednesday, November 14, 2018. The testimony summarized below pertains to Bill 22-880, which was reintroduced as Bill 23-22. Pursuant to Council Period 23 rule 501(a)(2), an additional hearing on Bill 23-22 is not required.

Copies of written testimony are attached to this report.

*Dena Iverson, Chief of External Affairs, Office of the Director, District Department of Transportation*, testified that the Executive has “no objection” to the “Adelaide Alley” designation. He noted that DDOT stands ready to assist the Council and all other stakeholders with any ceremonial unveiling activities.

### VI. IMPACT ON EXISTING LAW

Bill 23-22 has no impact on existing law. D.C. Official Code § 9-204.01<sup>22</sup> authorizes the Council to designate any public space. D.C. Official Code § 9-204.03 authorizes the Council to designate an official name for an alley “where an alley provides the only access to a residential or commercial property.”<sup>23</sup> Adelaide Alley provides the only access to a vacant lot proposed for development within Square 1090. Additionally, “an official name of an alley shall contain the suffix Alley or Court,” such as the name proposed by Bill 23-22.<sup>24</sup> Further, the Act provides that, with limited exception, no public space shall be named in honor of any living person or in honor of any person who has been deceased less than two years.<sup>25</sup> The Adelaide Alley Designation is in honor of Adelaide Johnson who passed away in the middle of the last century.

## VII. FISCAL IMPACT

Funds are sufficient in the fiscal year 2019 budget and proposed fiscal year 2020 through fiscal year 2022 budget and financial plan to implement the provisions of the proposed legislation. Because the cost to the District Department of Transportation (DDOT) is an estimated \$60 per official sign for fabrication and \$110 for installation, the cost of Bill 23-22 can be absorbed.

## VIII. SECTION-BY-SECTION ANALYSIS

<u>Section 1</u>	States the short title of Bill 23-22.
<u>Section 2</u>	Officially designates the east-west portion of the alley system in Square 1090, which is bounded by 16th Street S.E., D Street, S.E., 17th Street, S.E., and E Street, S.E., in Ward 6, as “Adelaide Alley.”
<u>Section 3</u>	Adopts the Fiscal Impact Statement.
<u>Section 4</u>	Establishes the effective date by stating the standard 30-day Congressional review language.

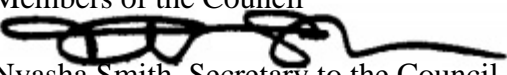

A BILL

IN THE COUNCIL OF THE DISTRICT OF COLUMBIA

To officially designate the interior section of the public alley system within Square 1090, bounded by 16th Street, S.E., D Street, S.E., 17th Street, S.E., and E Street, S.E. in Ward 6, as Adelaide Alley.

BE IT ENACTED BY THE COUNCIL OF THE DISTRICT OF COLUMBIA, That this act may be cited as the "Adelaide Alley Designation Act of 2019".

Sec. 2. Pursuant to sections 401, 403, and 421 of the Street and Alley Closing and Acquisition Procedures Act of 1982, effective March 10, 1983 (D.C. Law 4-201; D.C. Official Code §§ 9-204.01, 9-204.03, and 9-204.21), the Council officially designates the entire portion of the public alley system within Square 1090, which is bounded by 16th Street, S.E., D Street, S.E., 17th Street, S.E., and E Street, S.E., in Ward 6, as "Adelaide Alley".

Sec. 3. Transmittal.

The Council shall transmit a copy of this act, upon its effective date, to the Mayor, the District Department of Transportation, and the Office of the Surveyor.

Sec. 4. Fiscal impact statement.

The Council adopts the fiscal impact statement in the committee report as the fiscal impact statement required by section 4a of the General Legislative Procedures Act of 1975, approved October 16, 2006 (120 Stat. 2038; D.C. Official Code § 1-301.47a).



36           Sec. 5. Effective date.

37           This act shall take effect following approval by the Mayor (or in the event of veto by

Good afternoon, Chairman Mendelson, members of the Council, staff, and District residents. My name is Dena Iverson, and I am the Chief of External Affairs in the Office of the Director at the District Department of Transportation, commonly referred to as DDOT. I am here today to present testimony on behalf of



Mayor Muriel Bowser and DDOT Director Jeff Marootian regarding Bill 22-879, the “Crowdy Court Designation Act of 2018; Bill 22-880, the “Adelaide Alley Designation Act of 2018;” Bill 22-953, the “Anthony Bowen Way Designation Act of 2018;”and Bill 22-965, the “Hidden Figures Way Designation Act of 2018.”

The stated purpose of Bill 22-879 is to officially designate the portion of the public alley system bounded by 5th Street, N.W., M Street, N.W., 4th Street, N.W., and New York Avenue, N.W. in Ward 6, as *Crowdy Court*. As per the requirements of DC Act 21-489, Section 421(g), I have attached to this testimony a copy of the surveyor’s plat showing the public alley system within Square 514. In fiscal terms, the cost of each installed sign for these designations is approximately \$170 (\$60 for sign fabrication and \$110 for sign installation). Sufficient signage requires four total signs, totaling \$680.

The stated purpose of Bill 22-880 is to officially designate the interior section of the public alley system bounded by 16th Street, S.E., D Street, S.E., 17th Street, S.E., and E Street, S.E. in Ward 6, as *Adelaide Alley*. As per the requirements of DC Act 21-489, Section 421(g), I have attached to this testimony a copy of the surveyor’s plat showing the public alley system within Square 1090. In fiscal terms, the cost of each installed sign for these designations is approximately \$170 (\$60 for sign fabrication and \$110 for sign installation). Sufficient signage requires two total signs, totaling \$340.

The stated purpose of Bill 22-953 is to symbolically designate the 1300 block of W Street, N.W., in Ward 1, as *Anthony Bowen Way*. As per the requirements of DC Act 21-489, Section 421(g), I have attached to this testimony a copy of the surveyor's plat showing the block between Square 234 and 235. In fiscal terms, the cost of each installed sign for these designations is approximately \$170 (\$60 for sign fabrication and \$110 for sign installation). Sufficient signage requires two signs, totaling \$340.

The stated purpose of Bill 22-965 is to symbolically designate the 300 block of E Street, S.W., in Ward 6, as *Hidden Figures Way*. As per the requirements of DC Act 21-489, Section 421(g), I have attached to this testimony a copy of the surveyor's plat showing the block between square 537 and 538. In fiscal terms, the cost of each installed sign for these designations is approximately \$170 (\$60 for sign fabrication and \$110 for sign installation). Sufficient signage requires two total signs, totaling \$340.

Sufficient signage requires 10 total signs, totaling \$1,700. DDOT is able to absorb the costs of these signs within its current budget and does not foresee any operational impact this designation would have on the District's transportation network.

Therefore, the Administration has no objection to these designations, and DDOT stands ready to assist the Council and all other stakeholders with any

ceremonial unveiling activities that may materialize as a result of passage of these bills.

At a properly noticed meeting of Advisory Neighborhood Commission 6B with a quorum present on March 13, 2018, the Commission voted 5-0-0 to request that you introduce emergency legislation to name the interior alley of Square 1090, which is bounded by 16<sup>th</sup> and 17<sup>th</sup> Streets and D and E Streets SE, as "Adelaide Alley".

Doing so will enable Andrew and Hannah Linn to obtain building permits to build a by-right home on Lot 60 in the interior of the Square. After consultation with the Andrew and Hannah Linn and with residents of the Square, the ANC suggests this name in honor of Adelaide Johnson (1859-1955), a noted human rights advocate and sculptor who is buried in nearby Congressional Cemetery. 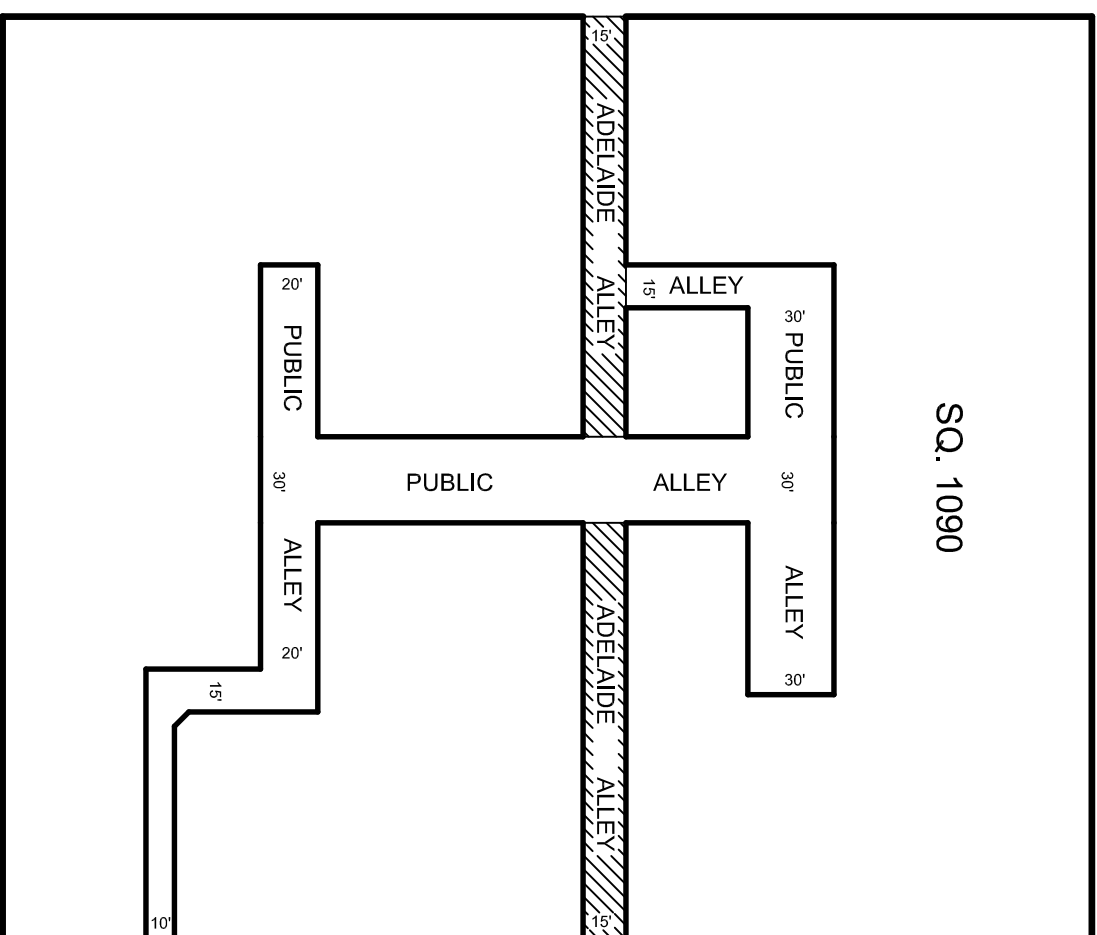



The bill designates the entire public alley system within Square 1090, bounded by 16<sup>th</sup> Street, S.E., D Street S.E., 17<sup>th</sup> Street, S.E., and E Street S.E., in Ward 6, as “Adelaide Alley”.

**Financial Plan Impact**

Funds are sufficient in the fiscal year 2019 budget and proposed fiscal year 2020 through fiscal year 2022 budget and financial plan to implement the bill. Required sign installation will cost approximately \$340, which the District Department of Transportation can absorb within its existing resources.
