SUBJECT: Report on Bill 23-166, the "Potomac River Bridges Towing Compact Amendment

Act of 2020"

The Committee of the Whole, to which Bill 23-166, the "Potomac River Bridges Towing Compact Amendment Act of 2020" was referred, reports favorably thereon, with technical amendments, and recommends approval by the Council.

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I. BACKGROUND AND NEED

Bill 23-166, the "Potomac River Bridges Towing Compact Amendment Act of 2019" was introduced by Chairman Phil Mendelson at the request of the Mayor on February 18, 2019. The purpose of Bill 23-166 is to amend the Potomac River Bridges Towing Compact of 1999² (Towing Compact) to add four new bridges: (1) the Governor Harry W. Nice Memorial/Senator Thomas "Mac" Middleton Bridge; (2) the Sandy Hook Bridge; (3) the Brunswick Bridge; and (4) the Point of Rocks Bridge.

None of the bridges being added cross into the District. However, the District is a signatory to the Towing Compact, so Bill 23-166 has to be approved – along with similar legislation in Maryland and Virginia – for the Towing Compact to be enforceable on the four new bridges. The

closest bridge being added to the Towing Compact is over 40 miles away from the District's border.³

The purpose of the Towing Compact is to grant authority to law enforcement agencies from each of the respective jurisdictions to remove disabled and abandoned vehicles from the bridges.⁴ This allows for faster clearance of these vehicles in order to promptly free up clogged arteries. All vehicles towed or removed from the bridges shall be subject to the exclusive jurisdiction of the place to which the vehicle is taken.⁵ The handling and disposition of the vehicle is governed by the laws and procedures of the jurisdiction where it was taken.⁶

The Towing Compact idea was initiated by the Virginia Department of State Police in 1989, when it submitted draft language to the Metropolitan Washington Council of Governments (MWCOG).⁷ The draft language was endorsed by MWCOG's Public Safety Policy Committee in 1990.⁸ By 1991, both Virginia and Maryland enacted legislation to enter into the Compact.⁹ The District did not approve legislation until 1999 after several problems associated with the "Million

Man March" and "Justice for Janitors" demonstrations, and a suicide attempt on the Woodrow Wilson Bridge demonstrated the need for the District to enter into the Towing Compact. ¹⁰

In 2019, Virginia approved legislation to modify the Towing Compact to add the four new bridges. ¹¹ Virginia's statute provides that the amendment to the Towing Compact will not become effective until 30 days after similar legislation is approved by the District and Maryland. ¹² Maryland is in the process of adopting legislation to modify the Towing Compact before the end of its 2020 legislative session. ¹³ Maryland's proposed legislation takes effect on June 1, 2020, but it is contingent on similar legislation being approved by Virginia and the District. ¹⁴

The Committee recommends approval of Bill 23-166, as it will contribute to the efficiency of traffic operations in the Washington metropolitan area.

III. POSITION OF THE EXECUTIVE

IV. COMMENTS OF ADVISORY NEIGHBORHOOD COMMISSIONS

The Committee received no testimony or comments from any Advisory Neighborhood Commissions on Bill 23-166.

V. SUMMARY OF TESTIMONY

The Committee of the Whole held a public hearing on Bill 23-166 on Thursday, January 23, 2020. The testimony summarized below is from that hearing. A copy of the written testimony is attached to this report.

Lee Goodall, Chief of Staff, District Department of Transportation, testified in support of Bill 23-166 because it will update the Towing Compact, in collaboration with Maryland and Virginia, by adding four new bridges. He testified that the Towing Compact will only be enforceable on the four new bridges if each jurisdiction amends their respective versions of the Towing Compact.

VI. IMPACT ON EXISTING LAW

Bill 23-166 amends D.C. Official Code § 9-1117.01(c) to add the Governor Harry W. Nice Memorial/Senator Thomas "Mac" Middleton Bridge, Sandy Hook Bridge, Brunswick Bridge, and Point of Rocks Bridge to the list of bridges covered under the Towing Compact.

VII. FISCAL IMPACT

The attached February 10, 2020 fiscal impact statement from the District's Chief Financial Officer states that funds are sufficient in the FY 2020 through FY 2023 budget and financial plan to implement Bill 23-166.

VIII. SECTION-BY-SECTION ANALYSIS

Section 1 States the short title of Bill 23-166.

Amends section 2(c) of the Potomac River Bridges Towing Compact Act of 1999 to add the Governor Harry W. Nice Memorial/Senator Thomas "Mac" Middleton Bridge, Sandy Hook Bridge, Brunswick Bridge, and Point of Rocks Bridge to the list of bridges covered under the Towing Compact. None of the bridges being added cross into Washington, DC.

Section 3 Adopts the Fiscal Impact Statement.

Section 4 Establishes the effective date (standard 30-day congressional review language).

Enclosed for consideration and approval by the Council of the District of Columbia is the "Potomac River Bridges Towing Compact Act of 2019." This bill will add the Harry W. Nice Bridge, Sandy Hook Bridge, Brunswick Bridge, and Point of Rocks Bridge to the list of bridges covered by the Potomac River Bridges Towing Compact (Compact). None of these four bridges cross into Washington, DC. The closest of the four is over 40 miles from the Washington, D.C. border. Good afternoon Chairman Mendelson, members of the Council, staff, and District residents. My name is Lee Goodall, and I am Chief of Staff at the District Department of Transportation. I am here today to present testimony on behalf of Mayor Muriel Bowser and DDOT Director Jeff Marootian regarding Bill 23-166, the Potomac River Bridges Towing Compact Amendment Act of 2019.

My testimony will be brief. The Executive supports this legislation and recommends that it be passed. The stated purpose of Bill 23-166 is to amend the Potomac River Bridges Towing Compact Act of 1999 to add four more bridges to the number of bridges covered under the Compact. The bill will add the Harry W. Nice Bridge, Sandy Hook Bridge, Brunswick Bridge, and Point of Rocks Bridge to the list of bridges covered by the Compact. The purpose of the Compact is to allow law enforcement officers from either side of a bridge to direct traffic around an accident occurring on the bridge and direct the safe clearance of the accident.

None of these four bridges cross into Washington, D.C. The closest of the four is over 40 miles from the District of Columbia border. As such, no District government resources will be expended to enforce this compact on these four additional bridges. However, these four bridges do cross between Maryland and Virginia, the other members of this Compact. For the Compact to be enforceable on the four new bridges, all three jurisdictions must add them to their respective versions of the Compact. Virginia updated their version of the legislation in 2019,

and Maryland is in the process of adopting substantially similar legislation to modify the Compact.

This concludes my testimony. Thank you for allowing me the opportunity to testify before you today. I am available to answer any questions that you may have.
