SUBJECT: Council Period 24 Report of the Committee of the Whole

This report highlights the Committee of the Whole’s accomplishments during the two-year period marking the 24th Council Period of the Council of the District of Columbia. This report includes a summary of activities, a survey of the many legislative and oversight achievements, and a review of the Committee’s budget recommendations for fiscal years 2022 and 2023. Appendices provide a listing of the measures marked up by the Committee during Council Period 24, and a chronology of the Committee’s public hearings, roundtables, and meetings.

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I. JURISDICTION¹

During Council Period 24, the Committee of the Whole (“Committee”) was responsible for matters concerning the annual budget, and amendments, additions, or supplements to the budget; coordinating the Council’s relationships with the Congress and the Federal executive branch; monitoring the progress of Council legislation through Congress; monitoring the status of original legislative proposals in Congress that may affect the District, the Council, or its legislation; amendments to the District Charter; Council appointments to Boards and Commissions; public-space naming; street and alley acquisition and closing; reapportionment and realignment of the political subdivisions of the District; Council administration and personnel; the scheduling of all matters for consideration by the Council in the legislative meeting; legislative matters related to the District as a political entity, including voting rights and statehood; matters affecting the Freedom of Information Act; coordinating the Council’s relationships with appropriate regional, state, and national associations and organizations; the Council’s relationship

with regional authorities and other regional bodies and organizations not specifically assigned to other committees; public-education matters concerning Pre-K through Grade 12 and truancy; public-education matters exclusively concerning the University of the District of Columbia or the Community College of the District of Columbia; District employees' retirement; the development of the Comprehensive Plan and other matters pertaining to land use; matters related to statehood and self-determination for the District; revision and codification of Title 49 of the D.C. In addition, the Committee is greatly assisted by the work of central office staff designated to assist the Committee of the Whole including Dan Golden (Deputy General Counsel), Lauren Mendonsa (Assistant General Counsel), Anne Phelps (Budget Counsel) and Andrew Eisenlohr (Deputy Budget Director). The entire staff of the Office of the Secretary assists the Committee with coordinating agendas and staffing hearings, roundtables, and meetings including support services and the entire Council Office on Racial Equity. Formulation of the Committee of the Whole's Council-wide budget recommendations to the full Council would not be possible without the work of the entire Budget Office staff.

III. SUBCOMMITTEES

The Committee of the Whole Subcommittee on Redistricting was formed for Council Period 24 to guide the Council's work in the decennial census redistricting of Wards and Advisory Neighborhood Commissions. The Subcommittee was chaired by Councilmember Elissa Silverman. The Subcommittee held 10 hearings on Ward redistricting and 2 hearings on Advisory Neighborhood Commission redistricting. In addition, each of the Ward Councilmembers convened ANC redistricting task forces to guide the Subcommittees work on ANC boundaries.

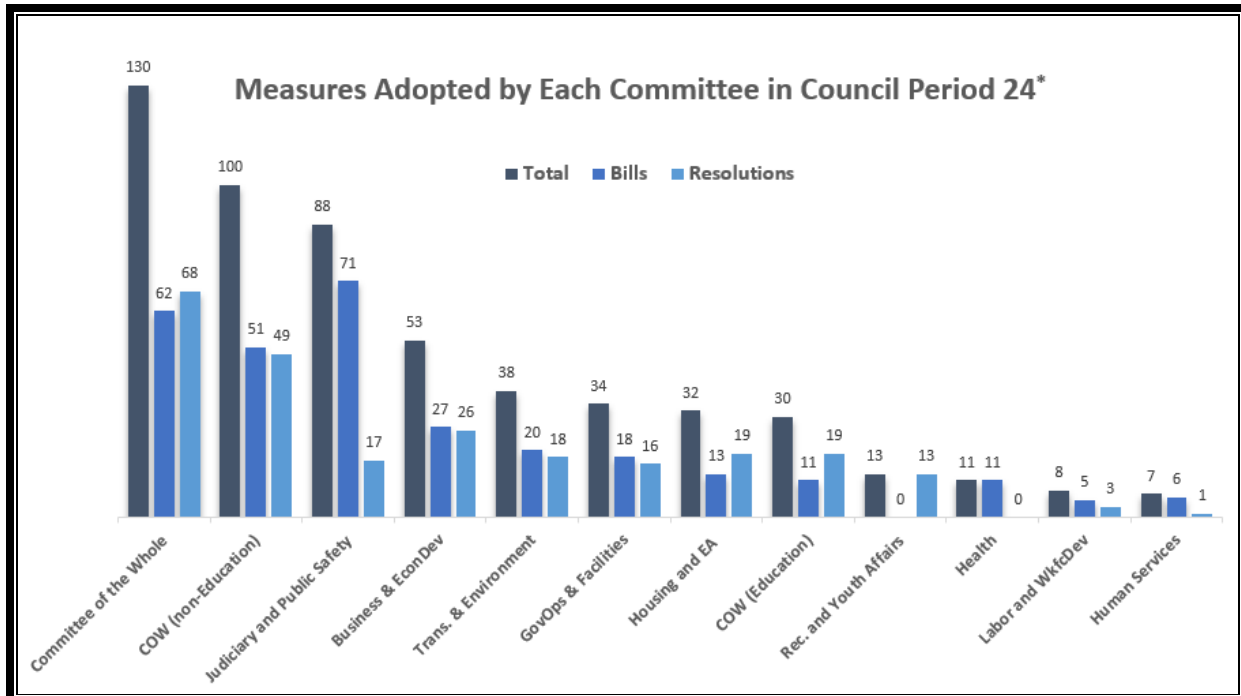
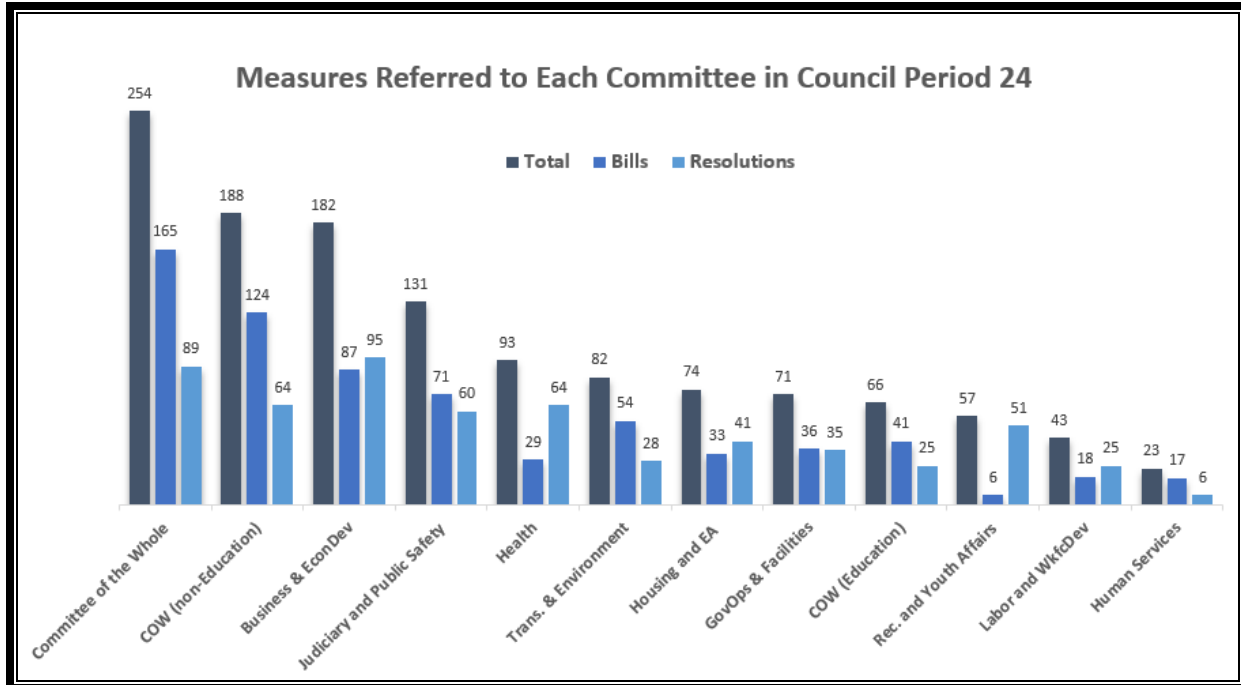
IV. SUMMARY OF COMMITTEE ACTIVITIES

During Council Period 24 there were 165 bills and 89 proposed resolutions referred to the Committee of the Whole. 62 bills and 68 resolutions were marked up. Five additional reports were adopted (page 28). In addition, provisions from four bills and three resolutions were included in other legislation marked up by the Committee. Eight resolutions were deemed approved without markup. Six resolutions were withdrawn before Committee action.

The Committee held 58 hearings (plus two reconvened hearings), 36 roundtables (plus one reconvened roundtable), two joint hearings, 12 performance oversight hearings, two budget briefings, and 12 budget oversight hearings.

The Committee conducted 21 regular meetings and 17 additional meetings to consider legislation and reports in the Committee and process reports from other committees.

V. SUMMARY OF COMMITTEE OVERSIGHT ACTIVITIES

The Committee laid out a number of overarching goals for Council Period 24. These goals were supported in large part by conducting public, transparent hearings and roundtables where the Committee could hear testimony on issues of interest to the Committee and press agency heads for more accountability. Those goals are listed below, with a brief description of activities the Committee took in furtherance of those goals.

- ***Improve services at the Department of Consumer and Regulatory Affairs and monitor the transition to the Department of Buildings and Department of Licensing and Consumer Protection:*** Focus efforts on improving services and programs at DCRA and ensure that the transition to the Department of Buildings and the Department of Licensing and Consumer Protection follows the intent and letter of the law.

Prior to the Department of Buildings Establishment Act of 2019 (D.C. Law 23-269) going into effect on October 1, 2022, the Committee continued its focus on improving the quality of services and programs operated by the Department of Consumer and Regulatory Affairs. The Committee specifically held roundtables on the implementation of a third-party inspection platform known as Tertius, the implementation of the Short-Term Rental Regulation Act of 2018 (D.C. Law 22-307) and the handling of vacant and blighted buildings throughout the District. Additionally, the Committee conducted two hearings on implementation of D.C. Law 23-269 to ensure that the agency split was following the spirit and letter of the law. These hearings informed several performance oversight and budget-related recommendations, including recommendations for specific key performance indicators for each agency, statutory changes to the Tertius platform, the addition of a public health analyst position at the Department of Buildings, and a significant increase in the Department of Buildings' budget to hire more housing code and vacant and blighted building inspectors.

- ***Encourage the Region's Move Toward More Environmentally Friendly Transit:*** Urge WMATA to speed its purchase and deployment of EV Buses and accelerate the timeline for WMATA conversion to an all-EV bus fleet.

The Washington Metropolitan Area Transit Authority (WMATA) operates the sixth-largest bus fleet in the United States, providing service to residents in Washington, Maryland, and Virginia, with more than 130 million passenger trips per year. While by the fall of 2019, there were 528 fully electric buses in service in the US — a 29 percent increase from 2018, WMATA currently has one electric bus. WMATA's stated goal of moving to all electric buses by 2045 is considerably slower than several transit agencies with larger and similar-sized bus fleets. The Committee believes that the WMATA Board should work to adopt a more ambitious timetable to transition the Metrobus fleet to electric buses to put Metro on par with major city bus authorities across the country and smaller bus agencies in the Washington, D.C., region.

There is now an increased federal emphasis on moving toward the electrification of both transit and school buses. According to the Center for Transportation and the Environment (CTE), of the United States' roughly 70,000 largely diesel transit buses, only around 2% are currently zero emission. Under the Biden Administration's \$1.2 trillion Infrastructure Investment & Jobs Act,

passed in November 2021, electric bus initiatives would receive approximately \$7.5 billion in funding. The Los Angeles County Metropolitan Transportation Authority, which has 2,320 buses, and the Houston Metropolitan Transit Authority, which owns more than 1,230 buses, plan to have an all-electric fleet by 2030. Their timetable coincides with the federal American Jobs Plan goal to electrify 50,000 transit buses by that date, which would include approximately 80 percent of the public transit buses in the United States. Meanwhile, the York City Metropolitan Transportation Authority, which operates 5,800 buses, and the Chicago Transit Authority, which has 1,864 buses, are both scheduled to be all-electric by 2040.

Accordingly, in September 2021, the Committee held a public roundtable on speeding the electrification of WMATA's bus fleet, and received testimony from electric bus manufacturers, a representative from Los Angeles' LA Metro, and other stakeholders including PEPCO. In January 2022, the Council passed PR 24-154, the "Sense of the Council Urging WMATA's Bus Fleet Electrification Resolution of 2022" calling on WMATA to commit to electrifying its fleet on a schedule that meets – and preferably exceeds – the deadlines in the Clean Energy DC Act, by agreeing to electrifying at least 50 percent of its bus fleet by 2030, 75 percent by 2035, 90 percent by 2040, and 100 percent by 2045; to move forward with its EV bus pilot program on a much quicker schedule; and publicly release a revised, accelerated bus electrification plan as soon as possible.

- ***Support Early Childhood Educators:*** *Establish a long-term mechanism for enhanced Early Childhood Educators pursuant to the Birth-to-Three for All D.C. Act.*

The Council unanimously voted to form an Early Childhood Educator Equitable Compensation Task Force ("Task Force") as part of the Fiscal Year 2022 Budget Support Act of 2021 to develop an updated compensation scale for child-development facilities to achieve compensation parity with elementary school teachers employed by the District of Columbia Public Schools ("DCPS"). The Task Force (which was supported by the Committee of the Whole) considered teacher roles, credentials, and experience in making recommendations for the permanent payment structure. While initial payments were made on a simplified basis for Fiscal Year 2023, the Task Force's recommendations were incorporated into the Fiscal Year 2023 Budget Support Act of 2022 to provide for the long-term support of educators. Beginning in fiscal year 2024, child development facilities that enter into a contract with OSSE will receive funds from the Early Childhood Educator Pay Fund to achieve, at minimum, the salaries for assistant and lead teachers.

- ***Sustain Truancy Reforms:*** *Identify and promote implementation of truancy reform initiatives as a means to identify students at risk for delinquency and then bring to them the appropriate services so as to improve attendance.*

The Committee of the Whole held three hearings on improving school attendance and how to address truancy issues. The Chairman called on all education and youth executive agencies including the Office of the Deputy Mayor of Education, the Office of the State Superintendent of Education (OSSE), the District of Columbia Public Schools, the Public Charter School Board, and Child and Family Services Agency. As a result, the State Board of Education and OSSE changed the regulations from the "80/20 Rule" to a "60/40 Rule" – which allows schools to count a student present when they attend 60% of the school day. This change will also allow student support teams

to focus their attention on students that miss entire days of school, as well as establishing policies for routine and situational distance learning. These changes were implemented prior to the start of the 2022–23 school year. Over the past decade public schools have worked diligently on these issues and have had little progress in reducing truancy. On average the District public school student misses 24.6 days of school (excused and unexcused) as compared to 17.3 last year. The Committee remains insistent on hearing new approaches that will actually reduce truancy and chronic absenteeism.

- ***Student Achievement Assessments:*** *Monitor student academic achievement through oversight of NAEP and PARCC assessments and hold District agencies accountable for fostering educational growth in students.*

For the first time in three years, the District administered the Partnership for Assessment of Readiness for College and Careers (PARCC) and the National Assessment of Educational Progress (NAEP) assessments. This was the first indicator of the level of learning loss suffered by students due to the COVID-19 pandemic. Two months after results were released, the Committee held a roundtable to examine the academic achievement in the District of Columbia Public School (DCPS) and the District’s Public Charter School (DCPCS) sectors. Specifically, this oversight hearing focused on DCPS’s and DCPCS’s performance, as well as their plans for educational growth. The assessment results were nothing less than disquieting. For example, only 9% of Black students in the District met or exceeded expectations in math; yet, 70% of white students met or exceeded expectations in math. Further, only 6% of at risk students and only 6% of students who attend public school in Ward 8 met or exceeded expectations in math.

- ***School Funding:*** *Increase resources for DCPS and Charter Schools through increases to the Uniform Per Student Funding Formula and supplement the At-Risk Concentration.*

Each year that the Committee of the Whole has had education under its purview, it has added funding to the Uniform Per Student Funding Formula in its Councilwide budget recommendation. In addition, during this Council Period, the Council added two new At-Risk Concentration weights (at levels of 0.05 each) to the Uniform Per Student Funding Formula (UPSFF) and provided greater funding for public and public charter schools that serve many at-risk students. This supplemental payment goes directly to schools and are unrestricted funds that principals can use on programs and services that support students who are at-risk. Concentrated poverty is tightly correlated with gaps in educational achievement. The Committee would like to increase the at-risk concentration supplement more in the coming years to continue to grow school budgets in our most under-resourced communities.

VI. SUMMARY OF SIGNIFICANT COMMITTEE LEGISLATION

All legislation has some significance, or else the Committee would not be legislating in the area. However, certain legislation is especially significant given its impact on the residents of the District or its contribution to more efficient, effective, or fairer government. Below is a list of some of the Committee’s most significant legislative accomplishments.

- **Bill 24-1**, “Comprehensive Plan Amendment Act of 2021”
- **PR 24-380**, “Comprehensive Plan Future Land Use Map and Generalized Policy Map Approval Resolution of 2021”

The 2006 Comprehensive Plan is the District’s 20-year blueprint for the city, laying the framework for the growth and development of the District. The main role of the Comprehensive Plan is to guide the independent Zoning Commission – under the Home Rule Act, the Council does not legislate zoning, but it does adopt the Comprehensive Plan, and zoning must be not inconsistent with the plan. In 2016, the Office of Planning initiated an amendment process for the plan that included over 3,000 recommended amendments by the public. That process culminated in the Mayor proposing an updated Comprehensive Plan Framework element which the Council adopted on October 8, 2019 and legislation to amend the remaining elements of the plan was transmitted to the Council on April 23, 2020. The Council conducted online public hearings in November of 2020 and reviewed extensive written submissions for the record. On April 20, 2021, the Committee of the Whole adopted the remaining Comprehensive Plan elements with a number of amendments from what was originally introduced by the Executive. The Committee’s amendments focused on accommodating growth in the District, calling for more housing (particularly affordable housing), considering equity and racial equity in zoning decisions, and changes to allowable density and future development in the accompanying maps. The Committee also approved the maps on November 28, 2022.

- **Bill 24-113**, “Medical Cannabis Amendment Act of 2022”

Since it was established in 2010, the District’s medical cannabis program has experienced very little growth or change due, in part, to prohibitive requirements for becoming a qualifying patient and statutory restrictions on licensing that have prevented competition and excluded specific populations from an opportunity to receive a medical cannabis business license. At the same time, a significant number of illicit cannabis storefronts and delivery services have opened, undermining the financial health of licensed medical cannabis businesses. This legislation addresses these issues by allowing patients to self-certify that they meet the definition of a qualifying patient, removing statutory caps on the number of licenses that can be issued, setting aside half of all new licenses for social equity applicants (defined in the legislation as a returning citizen, or the family member of a returning citizen, with a drug-related offense), and establishing robust civil penalties for illicit cannabis businesses. Additionally, the legislation creates new license categories and endorsements that will allow licensed cultivation centers, manufacturers, and retail dispensaries to innovate and serve more patients. The legislation represents a significant step forward for the District’s medical cannabis program that will undoubtedly benefit patients licensed medical cannabis businesses, and disadvantaged entrepreneurs.

- **Bill 24-301**, “Business and Entrepreneurship Support to Thrive Amendment Act of 2022”

The District’s current business licensing law has not been comprehensively updated in more than 100 years. As a result, licensing fees and requirements are often confusing and onerous, and many license categories are outdated or duplicative. This imposes a significant burden on entrepreneurs and small businesses across the District during a time of great economic uncertainty. Bill 24-301 modernizes and simplifies our business licensing law by reducing basic business license fees to a flat \$99, reducing the number of business license categories from over 100 to 11,

requiring notices be sent to licensees at least 60 days in advance of the expiration of the license to give them adequate time to renew, and exempting businesses with an expected or actual gross revenue of between \$2,000 and \$10,000 from having to pay business license fees. When fully funded, these changes to the law will have a positive and lasting impact on the many entrepreneurs and small businesses within the District.

- **Bill 24-357**, “Protecting Consumers from Unjust Debt Collection Practices Amendment Act of 2022”

Before the approval of emergency legislation substantively similar to Bill 24-357, the District’s law protecting residents against harmful debt collection practices was woefully out-of-date and inadequate, leaving tens of thousands of residents vulnerable to abuse, harassment, and other detrimental debt collection practices. Given the devastating economic impact of the COVID-19 pandemic and the significant gaps in the law, the Committee worked in close collaboration with the Office of the Attorney General and external stakeholders to craft and successfully approve Bill 24-357. This legislation significantly strengthens protections for District residents by requiring debt validation notices with precise language and information be sent to consumers before collection efforts, reducing unwanted calls and communications from debt collectors (including via social media, text message, and e-mail, which no other law in the country currently addresses), and requiring debt collectors to provide account-specific information in collection lawsuits to guard against “zombie debt.” Taken as a whole, the legislation is perhaps one of the country’s most progressive debt collection protection bills, and as noted by the Council Office of Racial Equity will “likely make progress toward achieving racial equity in the District of Columbia.”

- **Bill 24-429**, “Metro for D.C. Amendment Act of 2022”

The issue of free or subsidized public transit has been a hot topic for several years. Efforts to encourage use of Metrorail, Metrobus, the D.C. Circulator and other mass transit options have been undertaken by a variety of governmental and private entities. This legislation, first introduced in Council Period 23, originally sought to provide up \$100 per month in transit benefits via a District-issued SmartTrip card to eligible District residents. It also would have created a Transit Equity Fund to provide \$10 million annually to DDOT to improve transit infrastructure and service in areas in high-need communities. Funding would have come through capture of excess revenue above the Chief Financial Officer’s projections until the bill was fully funded.

The Committee on Transportation and the Environment marked up the legislation largely in line with the bill as introduced. However, the Committee of the Whole worked with one of the Council’s Board appointments to shift the immediate scope of the bill to establish a fare buydown agreement with WMATA to provide fare-free Metrobus transportation within the District and daily 24-hour Metrobus service on the system’s 12 busiest Metrobus lines. The legislation also converted the former Transit Equity Fund into a Bus Service Enhancement Fund for improved service in high need or other underserved communities to include possible creation of new bus routes, extended hours, or studies to support increased ridership or improved service.

The fare-free and overnight service, as well funding for service enhancement, will be paid out of the previously identified excess revenue mechanism with the goal of starting the service on July 1, 2023. In addition, the \$100 subsidy for MetroRail remains in the legislation, subject to

future funding. On balance, this legislation will be a game-changer for local residents who use transit and will provide a steady stream of funding to improve service at the same time.

- **Bill 24-570, “Schools First in Budgeting Amendment Act of 2021”**

Each year, DCPS releases school level budgets in advance of the Mayor’s budget proposal, and every year, the Council is disappointed to see decreases, resulting in loss of key staff positions and educational programming critical for supporting student learning. After holding four oversight hearings on the topic of DCPS school-level budgets the Committee took action by introducing Bill 24-570, the “Schools First in Budgeting Amendment Act of 2021” to revise the school budgeting process for the District of Columbia Public Schools (DCPS) by budgeting the local schools first based on the schools’ previous year budget, with the remainder to be allocated between central administration and school support. The primary purpose of the bill is to promote true stability in our local schools and increase transparency around funding for DCPS and its individual schools. The Committee will continue to take action to address the lack of equity in school level budgets.

- **Various Street and Public Space Commemorative Namings**

Commemorative works honor aspects of our history and individuals and should be important reminders of our history for current residents and future generations. In the District, there are so many monuments and commemorative works to individuals of national importance – as there should be in the Nation’s capital. However, naming our public spaces and buildings is also imperative for our local history that we seek to honor native Washingtonians and others who made Washington their home, and for events or entities important to residents.

The Committee adopted 19 public space names and approved a commemorative work to be placed in a public space during Council Period 24. Many of these commemorations were symbolic names to honor District residents who made an impact on their local community including Alice Washington, Rebecca Coder, Theresa Howe Jones, W. Cardell Shelton, and Wilhelmina and Calvin Rolark. In addition, the Committee adopted a number of official designations of public spaces such as removing Ellen Wilson’s name from a local street, renaming the now-Willie Hardy Memorial Bridge, renaming a school in honor of John Lewis, and renaming Wilson High School in honor of Edna Jackson and Vincent Reed. The Committee has also adopted symbolic namings for public spaces that recognize the District’s unique role as the Nation’s capital including commemorations for Jamal Khashoggi, a prominent journalist murdered by Saudi Arabia, and Ruth Bader Ginsburg, a locally admired Supreme Court Justice. Finally, the Committee adopted the sixth commemorative work under our local commemoration law in honor of Abraham Lincoln, placed at the African American Civil War Museum.

VII. SUMMARY OF BUDGET RECOMMENDATIONS

The information below summarizes the Committee’s recommended changes to the Mayor’s proposed FY 2022 and FY 2023 operating budget, and capital budget if applicable, by agency:

A. Fiscal Year 2022 Local Budget Act Recommendations

The following is a summary of changes and recommendations made by the Committee to the fiscal year 2022 budget as proposed by the Mayor for each agency under the Committee’s purview.

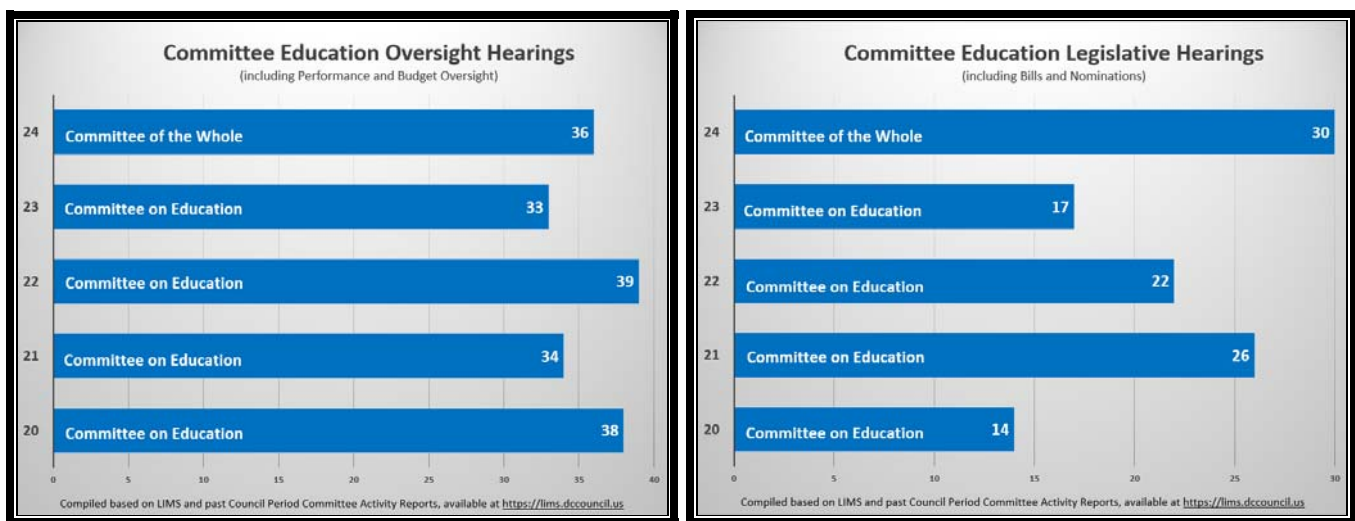

IX. COMMITTEE HEARINGS AND MEETINGS

The following is a listing of hearings and meetings held by the Committee of the Whole during Council Period 24. All hearings took place virtually via videoconference platform as a result of the COVID-19 pandemic. While this format has the benefit of increasing access to the public to testify, it has also created challenges related to broadcasting and providing materials timely to the public. In response, during Council Period 24, the Committee reengineered its hearing processes to include a central hearing signup portal on the Chairman’s website, a central testimony repository where submitted testimony is uploaded for public and Council access in real time, and broadcast of all hearings to multiple platforms (the Chairman’s website, the Council website, YouTube, and social media).

The Committee notes that Education has continued to be a major focus of the Committee even as a part of the Committee of the Whole. The Committee has held more oversight hearings than the previous stand-alone Committee on Education and has kept pace with former iterations of that Committee. In addition, the Committee of the Whole has exceeded past Committee on Education hearings on legislation, due in part to the Committee’s commitment to giving the public an opportunity to weigh in on nominations to education-related boards and commissions.
